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FOUNDATION OVERVIEW

Our mission

We believe every young Latin-American should have access to education, employment and develop the skills to become an entrepreneur.

Thus, our mission is to create opportunities for young, vulnerable Latin Americans so that they may prosper and, with them, their families and communities.

The reason

GANYDAR stands for 'ganar' (to earn) and 'dar' (to give). Our mission is to create opportunities for 20 million 15-24 year-old Latin Americans that can neither study nor work.

Almost 80 percent of common street crimes in Latin America are committed by individuals between 12 and 25 years old. Young people are also the biggest victims of violence.

Programmes

Offering hand-outs and subsidies is not the answer. These only perpetuate the cycle of dependence and poverty.

GANYDAR creates opportunities for young, vulnerable Latin-Americans to learn, work and create their own businesses. Our goal is ensure that vulnerable youngsters become a positive force of change for their families and communities.

- 1. Tools for Schools: training apprentices to learn a craft and preserve local arquitectural heritage.
- 2. Tools for Graduates: enabling apprentices to independently work straight out of graduation.
- 3. Joven.lat: a free, digital, opportunity portal to learn and find local jobs.

Policy

GANYDAR is not a charity and we never send money. GANYDAR provides tools, which we acquire directly from companies, such as Bosch and Hilti. In essence we manage the end-to-end process to maximise the impact.

Metrics

- 79% of graduates find employment when they graduate.
- 21% of graduates are women.
- 66% of graduates find employment in the field they studied.

• Central and South America.

2016 IN REVIEW

2016 was our first operational year. After GANYDAR's creation in 2015, the foundation chose to support three workshop-schools in Cuba: Havana, Trinidad and Cienfuegos, by providing tools to train apprentices. As part of the process, our team travelled to Cuba to determine the needs of the schools, met the professors and apprentices and received the approval of the local government.

Subsequently, the tools were purchased and our team rganised the shipment, handled all required custom approvals and ensured the delivery of the tools to the schools. These arrived on the 16th of October 2017. Below is the letter received by the director of the school of Cienfuegos.

ONGOING PROJECTS

Tools for Schools

From pre-Columbian temples to colonial Baroque churches, Latin America possesses a rich cultural heritage. However, neglect has led to the deterioration and loss of many heritage assets over the last seventy years. What if unemployed youngsters were to learn a craft and restore their local heritage sites?

The project's objectives are:

- 1. Train 300 vulnerable youngsters in a craft, enabling them to earn a living from day one.
- 2. Achieve a 70% employment rate after one year of graduation.
- 3. Participate in the restoration and preservation of 10 local heritage sites.

Tools for Graduates

The biggest challenge graduates face is not having access to the right tools to work. After extensive preparation, our foundation has launched a new, complementary programme: toolsets for graduates. This initiative gives graduates a basic toolset so that they can work and earn a living from day one after the School programme.

The project's objectives are:

- 1. Our goal is to donate 430 toolsets to apprentices in three workshop-schools: Colonia (Uruguay), Puebla (Mexico) and Brazil (João Pessoa).
- 2. Achieve a 70% employment rate after one year of graduation.

Joven.lat

With almost 150 million new mobile internet subscribers by 2020, Joven.lat aims to balance the information asymmetry that exists in the education and jobs markets. It offers free access to local and personalized learning and working opportunities to all youngsters that register.
